Opening Thought

"I am the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired man, who is not a shepherd, does not own the sheep. He sees the wolf coming, leaves the sheep, and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the sheep and scatters them. Because he works for money, he does not care about the sheep. "I am the Good Shepherd. I know my sheep and my sheep know me (just as the Father knows me and I know the Father). And I lay down my life for the sheep. I also have other sheep that are not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. Then there will be one flock and one shepherd. (John 10:11-16) A few summers ago, St. Mark hosted Professor Paul Koelpin from Martin Luther College for a summer family Bible study. Professor Koelpin's focus was on the four Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, and how each of them is unique. We learned when they were written, who was the initial audience, where they gleaned their information while writing it, and what special themes are found in them. One uniqueness of the Gospel of John is that about 90% of John's writing is not recorded in the other three Gospels. He wrote his Gospel much later than the other three so he "filled in a few of the blanks" in Jesus' ministry. One of John's themes in his book is on Jesus' "I am" statements. We will focus on one of those statements today, "I am the Good Shepherd." Three weeks after Easter is Good Shepherd Sunday. Many Christians find their most comfort in thinking about this theme. In Bible days, shepherding was a vital vocation. Sheep need guidance. They need a leader to show them where to find healthy grass to eat. They need a leader to protect them from foes that might harm them. They need guidance to find safe water to drink. Jesus fulfills all these traits. He leads us to the precious truths of his Word in his teaching. "Come to me all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28) The Holy Spirit has brought us to faith, and we believe Jesus' words. Whoever belongs to God

listens to what God says. (John 8:47a) Jesus became a human being and knows the challenges we fight when facing temptations. Indeed, because he suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted. (Hebrews 2:18) What a beautiful picture Jesus shares when he tells us that he is "The Good Shepherd." Most importantly, Jesus shares his greatest truth as "The Good Shepherd" when he shares, "The Good Shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." He demonstrates the contrast when comparing his work to the "hired man." When the hired man senses danger, he leaves the sheep behind. "Better that they die, and I save my life," he reasons. But not Jesus. He laid down his life by suffering on the cross to make payment for all of our sins. But God shows his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8) Why is the picture of Jesus as "The Good Shepherd" so comforting? We know what we deserve. Every day, we struggle with sin. We carry thoughts of anger and jealousy towards others. We wrestle with addictions that we are too ashamed to admit. We lash out and hurt those who are closest to us through our careless words. We rationalize our sins by thinking that it won't hurt anyone, or that I will only do this one time. We don't always do our best when living our vocations as a spiritual leader for our children. We get lazy and don't do our best when working our jobs. We ultimately realize and know what our sins do to our relationship with God. No, it is your quilt that has separated you from your God, and your sins have hidden God's face from you, so that he does not hear. (Isaiah 59:2) When we use the Ten Commandments as a mirror and see our sins, we find much comfort knowing we have "The Good Shepherd." The apostle John shares this truth in one of his epistles. If anyone does sin, we have an Advocate before the Father: Jesus Christ, the Righteous One. He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the whole world. (I John 2:1b-2) Note well that John tells us that he is the "atoning sacrifice ... for the whole world." Jesus too reminds us, "I also have other sheep that are not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice." As Jesus' sheep we have the opportunity to share the Gospel message with those around us. Consider your

3rd & 4th Grades ~ Mrs Pitt

We have been busy in the third and fourth grade room. We are looking forward to the Spring Fling on Friday! This week we decorated our horse heads for the event and they all turned out great!

The students in Grades 5-6 continue to grow in their Bible History study. We have been actively studying the divided kingdom of Israel into two nations, Judah (two tribes) and Israel (ten tribes). The LORD provided many prophets during this time to show them their sins of idolatry and to direct them back to the LORD. Two noted prophets were Elijah and Elisha.

For Catechism, we continue to study the Lord's Prayer. We have recently studied the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Petitions. We will be finishing Catechism in a few short weeks. Their final test will be on Tuesday, May 14.

For science, we have made a significant switch. We are finishing the year by studying life science. The students learned about ecosystems and why food webs are more realistic than food chains.
